Social Skills

So far this year, we have introduced our students to six topics from the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships program, as part of the Victorian Curriculum – Personal and Social Capability. The Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships learning materials have been designed for teachers in primary and secondary schools to develop students' social, emotional and positive relationship skills. Efforts to promote social and emotional skills and positive gender norms in children and young people has been shown to improve health related outcomes and subjective wellbeing. It also reduces antisocial behaviours including engagement in gender-related violence. This term, we have worked on Stress Management and Help-Seeking.

TOPIC 5: STRESS MANAGEMENT - Children and young people experience a range of personal, social and work-related stressors in their everyday lives. Activities within this topic have an explicit focus on teaching positive approaches to stress management. Assisting students to recognise their personal signs and symptoms of stress, and to develop strategies that will help them to deal with stress effectively, will help students cope with future challenges. The activities focus on the ways in which self-calming strategies can be used to manage stressful situations.

TOPIC 6: HELP-SEEKING - Learning activities in this topic area are designed to help students discuss the importance of seeking help and providing peer support when dealing with problems that are too big to solve alone. This helps to normalise and de-stigmatise help-seeking behaviour. Scenario-based activities help students identify situations in which help should be sought, identify trusted sources of help, and practice seeking help from peers and adults.

Proficiency Scales:

Over the past two weeks, students have been sharing their achievements with families, using a Proficiency Scale. We encourage you to ask your child/ren about their learning and remind them to share their proficiency scales. Depending on year level, this may look different;

- In Year 4, 5, & 6 - A homework task using video recordings of learning conversations (or similar) about Proficiency Scales on their Google Classroom or Drive.
- In Year 1, 2, & 3 - Sending home a copy of a proficiency scale and optionally a work sample
- Prep - Sending home a Proficiency Scale that is separate to the Reading Conference Book. (I.e. Maths)
- Specialist – your child should have at least one proficiency scale from either Art, Music, P.E. Or French.

We hope you enjoy celebrating with your children at home!

Cyber Safety and Digital Use over the holidays:

Throughout this year, we have continued to monitor and adapt our Cyber Safety and Digital Learning to keep up with our technological and social society. We have introduced **YouTube Guidelines**, to help students learn skills around using this website safely. We have worked with students and teachers to develop a list of great websites to use during wet-weather and OSHC. And, we have asked for parents to monitor the use of Roblox and Discord (not accessible at school) at home as these two programs are not recommended due to their in-built messaging. This site helps provide more information and tips on how to monitor and use them appropriately. 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Reminder about bell times

Parents are reminded of the school bell times for arrival in the morning and home time at the end of the school day. Students are expected to be at school and in their classrooms at 8.55am each morning. The first bell rings at this time to allow students to organize their belongings (lunch orders, water bottles, reading satchels, homework etc.) at the beginning of the day. Any students who arrive before 8.30am are to proceed to the school office. Students should not be dropped off and left in the playground without parental supervision before this time. The playground is supervised from 8.50am for student arrival. The Before Care program dismisses students at this time. There has been an increase in the number of students arriving well before 8.30am each morning. Similarly the home time bell rings at 3.15pm for afternoon dismissal. At this time all students who walk home or meet their parents along the way need to leave the school grounds. Following the final bell, which rings at 3.30pm, students who have not been collected by their parents or carers are asked to come to the school office, where a staff member will telephone parents. On the occasion of a parent being potentially late for pickup time a phone call should be made to the office explaining this and the student will be called to the office area to await collection. Many students are staying on and playing in the playgrounds or on the soccer pitch after school. The playground is supervised until the final bell at 3.30pm and all students should have left the school grounds by this time. Teachers have meeting and preparation commitments after school. Students who are still in the playground after this time may cause problems for the Out of School Hours Care Program, which requires access to all available outside playing areas each afternoon. It is recommended that students are not to go to the library over the road from school without parental supervision. It is not the responsibility of the librarians to supervise and manage students. Your support with this will ensure the safety and well being of all students.

2017 Camping Program at Wembley

The camping program at Wembley enables students to further their learning and social development in a non-school setting. It is designed to assist with the gradual development of independence and responsibility by providing engaging, challenging and educational experiences beyond the classroom, for all students. The program has been sequentially planned to enable all students from Prep through to Year 6 to participate in.

To assist parents with future planning the following dates of camps for 2017 have been confirmed.

Year 4-Sovereign Hill, Ballarat-Monday 27 to Wednesday 29 November (3 days, 2 nights)

Year 3-The Island, Phillip Island-Wednesday 29 November to Friday 1 December (3 days, 2 nights)

Year 1-Games, dinner and movie at school-5.00-November-December, date to be decided

Prep-Stay and Play-afternoon tea and games at school, adjacent to school day, November-December, date to be decided.
